OUR MISSION

"Nyack Center serves the Nyacks and the larger community of Rockland County by supporting children, youth and families through educational and recreational programs. Our non-profit organization provides a welcoming gathering space for vital before-and-after school activities, cultural celebrations and community events".

Nyack Center was founded 30 years ago in 1990 by a group of concerned citizens and is housed in a renovated historic church in the heart of Nyack, N.Y. We provide the lowest cost before-and-after school care in Rockland County and The Hudson Valley Region.

As we close the chapter on our 29th year of service, we want to express our gratitude to our beloved community. In this pandemic now more than every we are so grateful. Our donors and pro-bono supporters make it happen every day! Many thanks to all of you for making a difference in the lives of children and families in our community, 98% of whom are at or below the Federal Income Guidelines for Poverty.





PROGRAMS

BREAKFAST CLUB

Provides 44 children, grades K-5 with educational and recreational activities, a nourishing breakfast and mentoring before school, from 7:00 am to 8:15am. In collaboration with The Nyack School District, students are bused to their various schools.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

Operating until 5:30pm, 87 students K-8 in The Nyack School District receive homework help and a nutritional after school snack. Children participate in educational, creative and recreational activities. Homework help also includes access to a computer to complete school assignments. In collaboration with The Nyack School District, students are bused from their various schools to the center.

COMPUTER TIME

The program provides about 25 youth daily with computer and recreational activities Monday-Friday 5:30-8:30 pm throughout the year. The program was created to meet the urgent need to provide computer and internet access for the substantial number of children and youth in our community who do not have access to a computer at home. A Computer Coach and Tutor supervise and mentors the youth.

CAMP NYACK

For the last 10 years, Nyack Center has contracted with The Village of Nyack to run its summer camp for children from K-6 grade. In 2019, camp was seven weeks, 5 days a week from 8:30-3. Activities include: free breakfast and lunch, swimming, arts and crafts, sign language, science, gym time, dance, martial arts, reading, swimming 4 days a week at Rockland Lake and weekly field trips. Campers pay on a sliding scale dependent on family income. In 2019, 124 of 126 total Campers attended camp with scholarships. The seventh week and Camp After Care were added in 2017 in response to a parent survey and focus group.

TEEN COUNCIL

A substance free performance and leadership program for teenagers. A student board and adult advisors coordinate the program. Students meet weekly and plan events two times per month. A collaborative project with O.C.A.D.A. and Nyack Public Schools.



PROGRAMS

NYACK YOUTH COLLABORATIVE

A monthly meeting of over 40 youth service organizations in Rockland County. A series of youth forums and an employment night are run each year—the first of its kind in Rockland County. Four different Rockland collaborative programs grew from this pilot.

SUMMER YOUTH ENRICHMENT

In addition to Camp Nyack, Nyack Center hosts an onsite program for up to 35 youth. Summer Youth Enrichment is open M-F from 9:30-3 for 10 weeks. The program is free with breakfast and lunch-classes include: Please Pick Project with local Chefs, Recording Studio Time, Day Hiking, Computer Time, Summer Reading, arts & crafts and recreational time.

DEMOGRAPHICS


Our programs are open to the community. Most of our students are from our primary catchment area, which includes the public housing complexes near the Center, many of whom come from single-parent households. 98% of our children are at or below the Federal Income Guidelines for Poverty. For a family of four that is \$24,600.

Priority is given to working parents. In survey and focus groups with parents who use Nyack Centers programs, parents found that without affordable options provided by Nyack Center, they could not afford to work or live in our community. Our programs serve children ranging from K-12 grades.

Our current enrollment is 54% Latino, 34% African American, 8% Biracial, 3% White, 1% Asian. Our Latino and African American students still underperform scholastically in Nyack Public Schools and nationally when compared to their white peers. Many of the youth in our community are at risk due to economic, social, educational and judicial issues. Our students range from Kindergarten to High School depending on the program.

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Nyack Center is in a beautiful and historic church building in the heart of Nyack. The current building erected in 1839 is 181 years old this year.

In 2202 Nyack Center celebrates its 30th year of service at a center of community life in the Nyacks and Rockland County. The community we serve defines Nyack Center and the role we play. Nyack Center was developed as a model for community government partnership. The village and community members saw the need for services for youth especially and came up with this unique way of providing programs under a non-profit umbrella separate from the village. We are grateful to the Village of Nyack along with all our government supporters for their commitment to Nyack Center.

Community life is what Nyack Center is all about. Nyack Center has long sought to provide a gathering place to discuss concerns and find solutions. To that end, Nyack Center provides space for discussion, programs to learn and services to youth to prevent more violence and find stable options for them to become successful in school, at home and in our community. We run programs for school age children, at risk youth, and teens. We provide space to many

organizations that hold events, meetings and workshops that enhance our community life here in the heart of Nyack.

1990 Establishment of Nyack Center. "It was created in 1990 from the vision of two Presbyterian ministers who saw a potential to renovate the building to its past glory while benefiting the community. They foresaw an "urban mission" where townspeople would decide how best to utilize the space.

Demographically, ethnic and poorer communities were located in the hills behind the Center, while the more affluent settled in front of the Center along the Hudson River. The ministers hoped to break down social barriers by emphasizing the Center's hospitality at both the back and front door. Current programs grew out of

community needs. "The "Back Door", a teen run café, grew out of a need for teens to have their own space and express themselves. Children

alone at home before school due to working parents' schedules, evolved into "Safe Haven", later called "The Breakfast Club". Lastly, "The After School Program" solved a latchkey and homework help problem. "from old fundraising documents
