

Letter from the Board Chair

May 2015



Every year at the Nyack Center comes with its own set of memories and milestones. Looking back at 2015, however, we can truly say it was a year to remember.

2015 marked the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Nyack Center. Could the visionaries who began the center have imagined it would not just exist, but thrive twenty-five years later? We celebrated with a 25year blog, a glittering Legacy Gala – our most successful ever, a very special Holiday Readings event and a host of other celebratory moments.

2015 was also the middle year of our three-year plan. This was a year largely devoted to infrastructure strengthening the core of our organization. The unglamorous work that ensures we will be still be thriving 25 years from now, including enhanced communications and data management, media studio buildout and maximizing our financial security.

Notable successes in 2015 include:

 Winning a new grant from the Insurance Industry Charitable Foundation (IICF). This will allow us to upgrade our computer lab, and deepen our collaboration with Nyack Public Schools, thus enhancing the curriculum relevant educational support we offer.

- Completing the groundwork for the Nyack Center to purchase our land, expected to be complete by the end of 2016.
- Enhancing organizational capacity, allowing us to seamlessly adapt to more stringent state rules and requirements for After School Programs.

This is all in addition to the backbeat of our regular programs: After School Program, Breakfast Club, Computer Time, Summer Camp, Teen Council, Family Connections; and the myriad meetings, events, celebrations, exhibitions, support groups, screenings and other community activities that happen at the Nyack Center.

Every success is thanks to the hard work and dedication of Nyack Center board, staff, volunteers, donors and community supporters.

Our first 25 years have been a time of accomplishment and also lessons learned. We are more committed than ever to meet our mission and make our vision a reality: A community where every child is valued, all families are supported, and each individual is celebrated.

Annual Highlights

As we close the chapter on our 25^{th} anniversary year of service, we want to express our gratitude to our beloved community

People often ask how Nyack Center can be the lowest cost school age care in the Hudson Valley region? The short answer is our community. Our donors and pro-bono supporters make it happen every day! Many thanks to all of you for making a difference in the lives of children and families in our community, 98% of whom are at or below the Federal Income Guidelines for Poverty.

Since we were together last we have-planted in our **Please Pick Gardens**, celebrated the life of Cynthia Hesdra and dedicated a **Bench by the Road** with Toni Morrison. We ended the 2014 school year with talent shows and a picnic and BBQ. We had a wonderful **Men Cooking** for Nyack Center fundraiser!

At the onset of summer, we rented our space to "Orange is The New Black" We had 104 campers at **Camp Nyack.** The Summer Food Program served free breakfast and lunch at **Camp Nyack** and **Nyack Center** each weekday. All throughout the summer, we had about 17-40 kids each day in our **Drop-In** and more again in evening hours.

We started September off with a wonderful **Back to School BBQ**. We served hot dogs and hamburgers, gave out over 200 backpacks of school supplies, and danced to a DJ all in our parking lot. About 175 community members attended! Our heartfelt thanks to **People to People, Rotary Club of Nyack and Bon Secours** for donating back packs, school supplies and getting our children off on a year of school success! By the start of the 2015-16 school year, Breakfast Club and After School Programs were full. We held our second annual **Hispanic Heritage Night** with food, dancing and art by **Ana De la Paz** and **Circle in the Farm**

Our fall programming was full with parents from our programs and throughout the Nyack School District meeting with Nyack Schools Elementary, Middle School and High School principals and our Superintendent, Jim Montesano at Nyack Center for **WELCOME NIGHT**, a collaboration with The **Family Resource Centers! PEOPLE to PEOPLE** continued their support with "It's in the Bag", a weekly backpack full of food for 100 children in Nyack Center's Programs given on Fridays for the weekend.



Eve Ensler hosted an evening to benefit our **Family Connections** program, **A Conversation on Restorative Justice.** The sold out event was organized by Jen Mancusco.

We marched in the Halloween Parade and our **Monster Mash** was a smashing success with live performance by our friend **Danna Banana**!

In November at our **Legacy Gala** Nyack Center celebrated our 25 Anniversary and honored community angels Chris & Bert Hughes and Sally & Roger Seiler! Thanks to overwhelming community support and a sold out crowd, we netted \$60,000 for our vital programs and Legacy Fund. At the event, a generous donor offered "*The Mark Jacobs Challenge Grant*", a matching grant of up to \$25,000. We have many people to thank-our amazing event chairs, fantastic committee, honorees, Nyack Center Board of Directors, staff, sponsors, Ned Kelly, advertisers, auction donors and everyone who helped make the night such a success! It was truly a spectacular 25 Anniversary!

This was followed by **Made by Hand**- a fantastic Arts and Crafts Bazaar now a preholiday shopping staple.

December was heralded in with Holiday Readings. Our thanks go to Elliott Forrest and Kevin Pariseau, all our

performers for creating a magical night of neighbors performing for neighbors.

Nyack Rotary had its annual holiday luncheon for 49 community seniors. Santa will be stopped by for a few ho ho hos! Over 200 gifts for our children at Nyack Center were donated by People to People, Grace Church, Orangetown Police Dept., Christine Corday Salon, Wright Brothers Real Estate, The Rosner Family, Riverview Nursery School, Kappa Alpha Phi Fraternity and Legacy X along with many other individuals and families. It is so touching that so many people care about our kids!

We kicked off our 2016 fundraising with our **Black History Celebration "".** We got lots of wonderful feedback about how moved our honorees were and inspired the audience was by the Oratory Contest and the program with a special shout out to Naomi's Program of Excellence. We participated with other community groups in **The Flint Water Challenge** and helped collect over 10,000. Then we had a sold out crowd for our **Women of Leadership and Vision Brunch**. Our honorees were touched and generous in their appreciation of Nyack Center. We hosted the Life **After Life** photography exhibit in March as well. It was an interesting and inspiring panel discussion organized by Jen Mancusco to benefit **Family Connections.**

A huge shout out to Nick Howard and Glenn Meyerson for delivering mulch as part of **Mulch Madness**. Another big thanks for Jen and Stu Chaitin and **Superior Waste and Carting** for donating all the mulch! Thanks to all of you who ordered it. Our **Rowathon- "Pull for a Purpose"** sponsored by our partners **The Rockland Rowing Association** was a great way to bring new faces and our teen Council into Nyack Center. Our children and staff marched in the **Nyack African American Parade**.

Each year we come closer to fulfilling our mission and the dream of a beloved community. It all happens because of the community we serve and the community that holds us.





Our Programs

Our programs are open to the Nyacks and Rockland County. Nyack Center is committed to providing low cost before and after school care to low income working families. Our fees for before and after school care are the lowest in Rockland County. As poverty rates rose in Rockland County, Nyack Center has seen an increase in the number of families we serve at or below the Federal Income Guidelines for Poverty. In 2015 98% of the children in our programs were at or below the Federal Income Guidelines for Poverty, an 8% increase from 2013. For a family of four that is \$24,250.

Most of our students are from our primary catchment area, which includes the low-income housing complexes near the Center, many of whom come from single-parent households

Priority is given to working parents. In a recent survey and focus group given to parents who use Nyack Centers programs, parents found that without affordable options provided by Nyack Center, they could not afford to work or live in our community.

Our current student enrollment is 46% Latino 48% African American, 4% White and 2% Asian. Our Latino and African-American students still under perform scholastically in Nyack Public Schools and nationally when compared to their white peers. Many of the youth in our community are at risk due to economic, social, educational and judicial issues. Our students range from Kindergarten to High School depending on the program.

In 2016 we were awarded a special grant by **The Insurance Industry Charitable Foundation** for a unique literacy based pilot program at Nyack Center. The goal of the program is to strengthen our children's reading skills and better equip them to be successful with Common Core and ultimately school outcomes. We are upgrading our Computer Lab and will have a rolling laptop cart.



Breakfast Club

Provides 43 children, grades K-8 with nurturing, educational and recreational activities and a nourishing breakfast before school, from 7:00am to 8: 15am. In

collaboration with The Nyack School District, students are bused to their various schools. The program is free.

After School

Operating until 5:30pm, 82 students K-8 in The Nyack School District receive homework help and a nutritional after school snack. Children participate in educational, creative and recreational activities. In collaboration with The Nyack School District, students are bused from their various schools to the center. Parents pay on a sliding scale based on family income.

Camp Nyack

For the last six years, Nyack Center has contracted with the Village of Nyack to run its summer camp for children K-6 grade. The camp is six weeks, 5 days a week from 8:30-3. Activities include lunch, swimming, arts and crafts, gym time, computer time, reading and weekly field trips. Campers pay based on a sliding scale based on family income.





Computer Time

The free program provides about 25 youth daily with computer and recreational activities Monday-Friday 5:30-8:30 pm throughout the year. A Computer Coach supervises and mentors the teens.

Teen Night Fridays

A substance free program for teenagers. A collaboration with O.C.A.D.A., The Nyack Center Teen Council and an adult advisor coordinate the program. Students meet every Monday at 6pm and plan events 2 or 3 times a month. This program is free to local teens.

Teen Council

A weekly meeting of teen leaders at Nyack Center. As part of our collaboration with O.C.A.D.A., the group and adult advisors plan Teen Nights at Nyack Center. Teens attend community groups and workshops to develop leadership skills and learn more about our community and world.





Nyack Youth Collaborative

A monthly meeting of over 40 youth service organizations in Rockland County. A series of youth and employment forums are run each year. The first of its kind in Rockland County. 4 different Rockland collaborative grew from this pilot.

Family Connections

Family Connections at Nyack Center supports families living in Rockland County who are separated due to the incarceration of a parent. The program provides professional and peer support, education and link to vital community resources to parents incarcerated in the Rockland County Correctional Facility, their children and families. There is a weekly mothers support group in the County Jail, part time pre- and post-case management services, and some mentoring for parents and their children. Family Connections Nyack Center is one of a kind program and has a proven track record in building stronger youth and



Land



History

Nyack Center is located in a beautiful and historic church building in the heart of Nyack. The current building erected in 1839 is 177 years old this year.

In 2016 Nyack Center celebrates its 26th year of service at a center of community life in the Nyacks and Rockland County. The community we serve defines Nyack Center and the role we play. Nyack Center was developed as a model for community government partnership. The village and community members saw the need for services for youth especially and came up with this unique way of providing programs under a non-profit umbrella separate from the village. We are grateful to the Village of Nyack along with all of our government supporters for their commitment to Nyack Center.

T.S. Eliot said that, "What life have you if not a life together? There is no life that is not in community." Community life is what Nyack Center is all about. Nyack Center has long sought to provide a gathering place to discuss concerns and find solutions. To that end, Nyack Center provides space for discussion, programs to learn and services to youth to prevent more violence and find stable options for them to become successful in school, at home and in our community. We run programs for school age children, at risk youth, and teens. We provide space to many organizations that hold events, meetings and workshops that enhance our community life here in the heart of Nyack.

1990 Establishment of Nyack Center. "It was created in 1990 from the vision of two Presbyterian ministers who saw a potential to renovate the building to its past glory while benefiting the community. They foresaw an "urban mission" where townspeople would decide how best to utilize the space. Demographically, ethnic and poorer communities were located in the hills behind the Center, while the more affluent settled in front of the Center along the Hudson River. The ministers hoped to break down social barriers by emphasizing the Center's hospitality at both the back and front door. Current programs grew out of community needs. "The "Back Door", a teen run café, grew out of a need for teens to have their own space and express themselves. Children alone at home before school due to working parents' schedules, evolved into "Safe Haven", later called "The Breakfast Club". Lastly, "The After School Program" solved a latchkey and homework help problem. "from old fundraising documents
